We feel so honoured when we hear from our service users about how much they enjoy Torch's resources: some people get in touch to say how much they've loved our holidays, others say what a difference Sight Loss Friendly Church has made to them. One lady, we recently discovered, has found our lending library to be a real lifeline, having borrowed almost 1000 books from us. We wanted to hear about the person behind all this reading so we spoke with Patricia Collison to learn more...

atricia first heard of Torch when she was at college: "Some of the girls were involved with Torch but I wasn't a Christian then and didn't really take much notice! It wasn't until years later in 1973 when I was 22, life had been a bit rough and the Lord had gotten me out of it. I'd started going to Bethshan Church in Newcastle and one day I went up to the front and gave my heart to Jesus. A lady called Audrey came over that day and asked if I would like to go to a Torch meeting on Saturday and that was the start of my journey!"

Since 1973 Patricia has been involved with Torch in various ways; attending Fellowship Group meetings, going on holidays and, of course, reading!
"I have books in braille and on DAISY and it makes a huge difference to me, it's the lion part of my life, I love listening to them. It's like Christmas

when you open a gift and you think 'oh, what's the book going to be?' I've got my talking book machine and I sit with it and I listen to it."

Faith is a very important part of Patricia's life: "It's the breath I breathe, it's everything. Jesus Christ is everything to me. I love going along the sea front and one day it was really stormy and the sea was so wild – it looked like washing-up liquid because it was so white and foamed up, ferociously banging against the sea wall. And I just thought, Lord, you're powerful, you can limit even the sea and make it go no further. It reminded me of Jesus stilling the raging storm."


Patricia says she would definitely recommend Torch to anyone else with sight loss: "Well, I've already recommended Torch to a couple of people at church in particular and told them about it. I gave a MegaVoice Bible to a lady who

wasn't a Christian and the Pathway ones as well I think are fantastic, especially for people that would struggle learning braille, plus the fact you could carry it around with you. I mean, I've got the braille Bible you know and it's amazing because I used to read the Bible stories to my son Peter in the dark! It is a real blessing having God's word to sit and read or listen to."

Of course a person with such a voracious appetite for books must have some good recommendations so we asked Patricia what hers were: "I would say 'A Lineage of Grace'

by Francine Rivers. It's wonderful, it's about five women in the Bible and kind of fills in the gaps about their stories, it brings them to life. I would say to anyone thinking of giving Christian books a go: do it! You've got a choice of braille, DAISY CD, memory stick or large print and the personal service from Torch is great."

We look forward to keeping Patricia supplied with books for many years to come - and if you know anyone who could benefit from our accessible library, please do tell them all about it because we have plenty of books ready and waiting to be read!

Braille around the world

How two machines from Torch made a big difference

Last year we were able to send two Perkins braille machines over to Egypt to be used by a church club for blind and partially sighted children. We're very happy to say that the braillers are being well used and much appreciated by the children.

he machines were sent to St Saviour's Church in Suez for the SWA Club. Friend of Torch Hugo Ansen, from the Grassroots charity, recently visited the club to see their progress: "They are doing a great job. 12 months ago just two children with sight loss were enrolled in the club but now they have 40 children involved, with sessions supporting their wider families, volunteers and some professional tutoring staff."

Activities led by the club include life skills, subject tutoring, community activities and braille lessons - which



is where the Perkins machines have come in extremely handy! Hugo says: "The vicar is Rev Adel Tomas. His wife, Rania, is the main instigator of this programme and continues to say that their long term goal is to run a state-of-the-art school for blind children. Their two teenage daughters are both blind and have greatly benefited from being part of the growing community, and having so many friends around so often."

The club has brought together children and adults with sight loss, helping them find a community which they all benefit from belonging to. "The most experienced teacher of reading braille is Donia," says Hugo, "She is a law graduate but has found it hard to practise as a lawyer because of her disability. She loves being part of the staff team (and having a paid job!) and being part of a happy community. She told me about how much she enjoyed investing in the young people's lives."

They are doing a great job. 12 months ago just two children with sight loss were enrolled in the club but now they have 40 children involved.

An update from Compass Braille



Four years ago, Compass Braille transcribed the Bible in the Ugandan languages Runyankore/Rukiga. In 2023 they were asked to transcribe a new version which uses more modern language and includes deuterocanonical books. This means it can be distributed within schools and institutions. We're very happy to report that the project was successfully completed and launched last November.

t the launch, Serumaga Peter Lumbuya (Acting General Secretary of The Bible Society of Uganda) said: "We are excited that this Bible will communicate to the people who cannot read with the eyes the rest use, those who feel the Word of God using their hands... It helps them also in education. It will be used for literacy, those who teach using braille and it also helps the people to feel that they are part of the community and, instead of pushing them aside because they cannot see, they will also feel included. And this will increase their spiritual life and their scripture reading so they will be part of the community as they are informed

and reading the message God wants them to receive."

A teacher of visually impaired children said: "We teachers have been struggling to bring for the children the Word of God, sometimes even omitting some words. But now these braille Bibles will help them because they just read them directly, no mistakes. Any time they want to read, they will read it. And they love the Word of God."

We praise God that this project was such a success and look forward to future projects bringing the Bible directly into people's hands around the world!

urprising information, isn't it? The reason that it's so difficult for braille users to get hold of a modern Bible goes back to the 2011 update to English braille. While this was a much-needed update and the new format (known as UEB) has made braille easier for new learners and resolved issues around sharing and copyright, one unfortunate result is that the existing braille New International Version of the Bible is now out of date.

We at Torch know how vital and empowering it is to have access to God's word in a format that is suitable for you. That's why we want to transcribe the latest translation of the NIV Bible, making it available in the new standard of English Braille.

Thanks to the generosity of our partners at the United Bible Society, and the wider Torch family, we have met the target we have been praying for – in fact smashed through it.

At the time of going to print nearly £40,000 has been given towards the project. What a generous God we serve! This means that we will be able to significantly subsidise 100 copies of the Bible. Please join us in praying that this would be a blessing to those like Shelia who previously have not had access to their own copy.

Tony Brown, Chair of Trustees, also spoke and encouraged our groups in the work they are doing. Tony's first experience of Torch was through meeting Clive Leakey who encouraged him to volunteer at the Daventry Torch Fellowship Group. He has been involved with Torch ever since.

After hearing from Sarah and Tony we then had the opportunity to hear good news stories from the groups that were represented. It was so encouraging to hear so many stories of God's faithfulness and his answer

Sunday 13th October 2024


