The Archdeacon thanked everyone for taking safeguarding seriously. He congratulated all those working hard on the dashboard and reminded the church the importance of maintaining the standards required.

8 Finance Report

There were no questions raised from the Financial Report. Thanks were expressed to the Treasurer and the Finance Team for all their work this year.

9 Appointment of the Examiner of Accounts

It was proposed by Sue Crompton and seconded by Jonathan Evason that we appoint The Barker Partnership as the Examiner of Accounts for the Financial Year 2025.

10 AOB

No AOB were received prior to the meeting.

10.1 Vacancy Update

Barry Crompton shared that the PCC have done a great deal of work since January. A job description has been drafted; a parish profile completed as well as the parish brochure. (The brochure was displayed on the screen). A copy will be sent out by email soon. Special thanks to Matt Mingay, who designed the brochure and to everyone who worked on it. The bar has been set high!

The advert has gone live on the Church of England "Pathways" from 7 May and also on the New Wine network, as well as being forwarded by our own networks and contacts. The closing date is 15 June and shortlisting by panel of Bishop of Ripon, Archdeacon, Patron of Simeon's Trustees and HTR Parish Reps on 18 June with interviews in early July.

10.2 Stewardship

The Treasurer reminded those present that we are "preparing the ground", as we move into this next season of the church's life. While our finances increased in 2024, they have dropped in 2025. There will be a teaching series in September to enhance our stewardship campaign but if people could review their giving now, it would be helpful.

The Mission Enabler role completes its two-year term in September 2025 and a special request was made to those who gave to this, to see if they would be willing to fund the position for another year – to September 2026. The funding has been raised to continue this position, and the PCC has approved this.

Kathryn Bailey stressed that stewardship is also about the way we use our time, talents and experience. Barry Crompton and Nancy Benham were thanked for stepping up to be Parish Reps to help with the recruitment of the new incumbent. But there is still a need for volunteers – some just to be and others just to do. Please consider if you can volunteer either through the web link or speak to the Churchwardens.

Dan Metcalfe gave an update that Chris and Ruth Butler were settling in well in Cornwall. Chris continues with his running and Ruth is working in the local GP practice. 2024 felt like the end of an era, and 2025 is a time of transition but God is very much still at work. We need to be ready – spiritually and relationally – leaning further into Jesus and into community, so we can discern God's leading going into the future.

There has been an army of people (seen and unseen) keeping the ship steady and navigating with energy and wisdom. The staff and volunteers have come to the fore and are a blessing. They have worked hard and deserve our thanks, as do the families who support them.

10.3 Thanks were expressed by Rob Ankcorn to the Churchwardens for all they do and are doing in the vacancy.

11 Closing Prayer

James Theodosius closed the meeting with a concluding prayer and was thanked for chairing the meeting, which finished at 12.45pm.

3. RIPON DEANERY SYNOD 2025

The Ripon Deanery Synod had three meetings this year on 8th May 2025, 2nd September 2025 and 13th January 2026. Also, on 24th and 25th February 2025 a Deanery Synod Away Time took place at Parceval Hall.

Meetings focussed on governance appointments, ongoing development of the Deanery Renewal Action Plan, and sharing parish initiatives across the Deanery.

Governance & Elections

Significant progress was made in filling key leadership roles:

- **Lay Chair:** Clare Slator was unanimously elected in September 2025.
- **Diocesan Synod Representation:** Dorothy Gray and Barry Compton were elected as Lay Representatives in January 2026; clergy vacancies remain.
- **Area Mission & Pastoral Committee:** Michelle Dearlove was elected in September 2025.
- **Deanery Treasurer:** Post remains vacant, though bank signatories were updated.
- **Deanery Secretary:** Temporary change announced in January 2026.

Deanery Renewal Action Plan

On 24th and 25th February 2025 a Deanery Synod Away Time took place at Parceval Hall with the aim of establishing a renewed vision for the Deanery, emphasising its role in **supporting small, rural parishes**.

A structured Action Plan was created, focusing on:

- **Identity & Communication:** Developing a clear Deanery identity, prayer, prayer diary, improved PCC–Synod communication, and a Deanery Diary.
- **Mapping the Deanery:** A full parish mapping exercise and creation of an accessible Deanery map.
- **Resourcing & Collaboration:** Strengthening links with retired clergy, LLMs, and the Cathedral; exploring a permanent Deacon role; submitting a Rural Change Fund bid.
- **Strategic Development:** Considering Eco-Deanery status, improving diversity and youth representation, and reviewing Canon Law for parish benefit.
- **Review:** Plan scheduled for regular updates, with the first formal review in January 2026

This Action Plan was reviewed at subsequent Denery Synod meeting, with updates circulated. A major development was the successful **Rural Change Bid**, securing funding for an **Outdoor Spirituality Officer**, with volunteers sought to shape the role.

Talks & Formation

The January 2026 meeting featured a well-received presentation from **Revd Canon Sean Robertshaw**, Diocesan Director of Vocations, exploring pathways into ministry and diocesan training.

Parish Activity & Collaboration

Parishes reported a wide range of mission and community initiatives, including:

- Pilgrimage routes, organ recitals, and local events across the deanery.
- Youth ministry development needs.
- Cathedral partnership projects such as *The Difference Course*.
- International links (e.g., Holy Trinity's Tanzania partnership).
- Requests for practical support, including church WiFi guidance.

Future Meetings

4. PCC SECRETARY'S REPORT 2025

PCC Meetings

In 2025, the PCC met in January, March, May, July, September and November. The APCM was held on 11 May, when we had the new Archdeacon preside over the meeting.

At the May meeting new members were welcomed to the PCC. There was a short induction of the responsibilities of a trustee; appointment of officers was agreed and sub-committees were confirmed.

The Standing Committee, comprising of the Lay Chair, Secretary, both Churchwardens, and Treasurer, also met in January, February, April, June, October and December.

In February, Jane and John Foster kindly hosted the PCC Away Day. This was an important time as the PCC considered the qualities they were looking for in a new vicar; discerning where Holy Trinity was heading in the future and what skills and resources were needed to cover the vacancy period.

In addition, there was a "Section 12" meeting in March with Bishop of Ripon, Area Dean and Simeon Trustee Patrong and the PCC. The purpose of this meeting was to confirm the Parish Representatives; agree the Parish Profile, Role Description and Person Specification of the new vicar; finalise Parish Brochure, agree the timelines for the vacancy process, and arrange the July interview date and the interview itinerary.

After the interview in July, the Bishop confirmed Phil Carman's appointment and Phil was inducted and installed in November. We were delighted to welcome him to our November meeting!

Key Topics

This is not meant to be an exhaustive list of everything covered in PCC meetings, but a flavour of some of the key topics covered. This does not detract from all the other topics and the work of everyone involved in all church activities. You can read the rest of the reports and see just how much goes on behind the scenes.

Many of the topics covered concerned the preparation of materials for the advertisement of the vacancy as well as the practicalities of running a church without a vicar. Holy Trinity continued to be well used by church members and the wider community. Decisions had to be made regarding such requests as things were not "business as usual" in a vacancy. The Diocese continued to require us to complete audits and mission statistics and respond to questions and proposals from the sub-committees.

Decisions were made regarding the Sunday services, Messy Church, Being Restored and Thursday communion.

The Mission Enabler's two-year funded role expired in September. It was agreed to extend the role for another year. This will be reviewed again when the new vicar is in place.

The Bishop of Ripon was keen that Holy Trinity became a Diocesan Training Hub. While AV and sound equipment was provided by the Diocese, there was still a lot of additional work required to set up Room 4 to be equipped to be a place for training courses to be held.

The Charity Commission requires that policies are reviewed or created to strengthen the governance of any organisation and there were several policies (Social Media, Complaints Procedure, Lone working/Safety) tackled this year.

Membership

Churchwardens

While the normal agreed practice is for churchwardens to be appointed for a maximum of 4 years, it was agreed that Dan Metcalfe would serve an additional year to help with the smooth transition during a vacancy.

Kathryn Bailey was appointed for a 2nd year.

We are immensely grateful to our Churchwardens for the additional responsibility and work they undertook this year in the vacancy. They provided the spiritual oversight and pastoral life of the church. They ensured our legal, financial and practical aspects of church life were adhered to and they communicated well with the members of the church during the vacancy process. All this was done with many extra hours, little fuss, always quietly in the background and with much patience, grace and wisdom. We also thank their spouses, Fizz Metcalf and David Bailey, for their patience and additional support.

PCC

It is normal agreed practice that PCC members are appointed for a 3-year term and can stand for two consecutive terms before standing down for at least one year. At the start of the vacancy, Don Hanson was elected as the Lay Chair in January and Nancy Benham took over as PCC Secretary.

At the last APCM Claire-Lise Harrison, Philip Thomas and Tina Durkin were elected as new members. Elliot Bennington was elected for a second term. Felicity Stevens was later co-opted onto the Deanery Synod. Thanks were expressed to Ruth Abel and Helen Wilks who stepped down from the PCC.

Thank you to all who serve on the PCC and for your support and help this year.

5. CHURCHWARDEN'S REPORT 2025

A year in the life of a Churchwarden is varied. Looking back across the last year, it seems like a year of two halves: in the first half we were in vacancy and busy compiling brochures, writing adverts and preparing for the interview process. A huge thank you is due to all who carried additional responsibilities in this season of Trinity's life.

Dan and I were particularly grateful for Barry Crompton and Nancy Benham who took on the role of Parish Representatives, releasing Dan and myself to be Churchwardens. This involved them in many more meetings at Trinity and with Diocesan personnel and then sharing information about the vacancy process and timeline with the PCC and congregation.

We also cleared clutter of several decades, shooed pigeons out of the tower, tidied offices, prayed and prepared for our new Vicar. Phil was duly appointed, and in a joyful celebration of a new ministry instituted as Vicar of Holy Trinity in November. In the second half year we have been excited to be discerning God's purpose for Trinity under his leadership. Planning is under way to establish a new service, bringing together our Church family.

A particular area of responsibility as Churchwarden is to ensure that our building is fit for purpose and thanks must go to the Fabric Team which is continually working on our behalf to make sure it is safe and comfortable, and we thank them for their time and effort. The terrier and inventory have been wonderfully updated, documented, and include links to photo records. So special thanks are due to Andrew Dennis and Elliott Bennington who have coordinated this work.

Sides people (Hosts or Welcomers) are the Churchwardens' assistants and appointed at the first PCC after the APCM. The current team of hosts at all our services are often the first point of contact on a Sunday morning and their welcome to new and old faces is to be commended. I also thank those involved in hosting upstairs at our 10.30 Communion service for directing the congregation where to stand to receive communion.

There are many visible, and also invisible, ministries that combine to make Trinity the place it is today. We thank all those who serve on the PCC and particularly those who are stepping down this year: Allison Clark has served on the Deanery Synod as one of our representatives, Don Hanson as our Lay Chair at PCC meetings, and Becca Green and Andrew Dennis have completed one term of three years but are willing to stand again.

Finally, our gratitude must go to Dan Metcalfe. He has been Churchwarden for five years, graciously staying on an extra year due to the vacancy. Thank you Dan for all you have contributed to Trinity in those years, holding a vision of where Trinity should be, prayerfully and conscientiously committing it to God. We are also grateful for your practical skills which you have offered to Trinity in the more demanding jobs around the church. This has been a considerable time commitment for you and your family, and we thank you for this dedication. Enjoy some well-earned rest, but continue with the Trinity family in Worshipping, Nurturing and Adventuring in the way of Christ.

6. CHURCH BUILDING MAINTENANCE AND REPAIR REPORT 2025

Fabric Team

The Fabric Team met six times during 2025.

Quinquennial inspection and roof inspection

The church architect carried out the Quinquennial Inspection. His comments during the inspection were generally favourable. He will issue a full written report in Q1 2026. During the inspection Vertex Access cleared the gutters, repaired loose slates and applied Smart Water to the leadwork.

Five Year Electrical inspection and upgrade

Brook Electrical carried out a statutory five-year electrical inspection which revealed several recommended system upgrades and installation of RCBO safety cut-out. This was a major £5000 upgrade, the first since the space project 20 years ago. It will future proof the electrical infrastructure for several years ahead.

Inventory and Terrier

The inventory and Terrier have been completely re-ordered with a full audit of all the church property and records. This was a major undertaking by Elliot Bennington and Andrew Dennis and is now stored on paper and electronically with a system for six-monthly updates.

Low carbon and environmental upgrades

Two consultancy reports were received for energy conservation, commissioned by the Diocese. The report by David Legge has many helpful recommendations and is being implemented in stages. 80% of the church lighting is by low emission lamps; the remaining are fluorescent tubes. The fluorescent tubes are being replaced over a four-year schedule with the boiler and offices in 2025. PIRs were installed in the corridor and stairwell.

Outside we instituted a no-mow area of the graveyard, a bug house and hedgehog house. We also have a compost area for felled wood and garden waste. The tower has swift boxes.

Trees

A diseased almond tree near the arches was felled after being condemned and has been replaced by an almond tree and several additional appropriate trees that were selected by the congregation. The youth church was involved in the re-planting.

Fire, heating, electrical, lighting and PAT inspection.

The fire alarms and fire extinguishers were serviced in November and EM lights stress tested. The PAT testing of portable equipment was carried out in January and lighting conductor in June. The Heating and boilers were gas safe tested and serviced in the autumn. The boilers have been given a five-year life expectancy to around 2030.

Work Parties

Four work parties were carried out in the year. A major tidy up and clear-out of indoor storage areas and accumulated junk resulted in trips to charity shops and the recycling centre. The churchyard was extensively tidied and the shrubs along the curtilage cut back improving the sighting of the church for passers-by. Following work to fix damp ingress to the arch's windows, these were re-painted. There remains minor moisture ingress which will continue to be traced down as it occurs.

Pigeon dung was cleared from the bell loft and the wire netting repaired to prevent further infestation. The bell rope was repaired and enabled to ring – just.

We replaced the outside Christmas tree lights with a brighter long-life replacement.

7. HEALTH AND SAFETY REPORT 2025

Risk Assessments

Health and Safety within any organisation is a balance between a totally safe environment which constricts activities and an environment that allows activities with guidelines and risk assessments in place.

The church has a set of risk assessments for many activities which are reviewed on an annual basis and with each new activity a new risk assessment is added to the church data base.

Safety Checks

The church has annual statutory checks undertaken by professional contractors. These include checks on Gas, Electric, Lightning Conductor, Fire Extinguishers and Fire Alarm systems. In addition, PAT tests, (Portable Electrical Appliances) are carried out annually and appliances that fail are replaced. These records are held in the office and can be viewed on request.

Every week the fire alarm, emergency lights and kitchen shutter are tested and the test recorded and any issues that arise are repaired as a matter of urgency.

New Legislation

The church also responds to new laws such as. "Martyn's Law" which has been introduced following the report into the bombing of the Manchester Arena in 2003. The church is currently working towards compliance.

One of the main issues for the church is the evacuation of the church in the event of an issue arising. In the last 12 months the church has undertaken two full evacuations; both at 9am and 1030 services; both have been successful and fulfilled the requirements for Martyn's Law and Fire regulations.

Accidents & Injuries

There have been two serious injuries within the church this year, both required hospital intervention. The accidents have been recorded and looked at in depth and the accidents occurred due to personal mobility. No modification of the church environment was

required. There are First Aid Kits located throughout the building which are regularly checked and restocked as necessary. The Accident Book is located within the kitchen.

The Kitchen

The kitchen has been registered with the Food Standards Agency and North Yorkshire Council's Environmental Health Service and was inspected in November 2024 and received the highest 5-star rating. The kitchen is rated as High Risk due to catering for children and elderly members of the church and the community. The kitchen is trying to operate to the highest standards of hygiene and user practice.

Future Works

As the church moves forward and to assist with the evacuations it is intended to build a permanent escape ramp, located outside the south transept door

8. TREASURER'S REPORT 2025

In financial terms 2025 has been a year of 'preparing the ground' for our new incumbent to arrive in November of this year. Although the net income for Holy Trinity church has been well managed, it is important to recognize that there has been a tightening of the budget in recent years. Net income for 2025 has shown a small reduction with expenditure showing a corresponding reduction.

Income

Income saw an overall 6% reduction this year of £16,460. This reduction was largely a result of a reduction in voluntary giving in both restricted and unrestricted categories. The exception to our income reduction was with regard to church lettings which increased by £7,647 (a 44% increase from 2024).

Expenditure

Given the reduction in income, staff and volunteers have worked hard to reduce expenditure. Net expenditure reduced by £16,575. Whilst overall costs were controlled well, the real impact on expenditure came from a reduction in payment to the Diocese of Leeds with the Parish Share reducing from £90,000 in 2024 to £72,000 in 2025.

Reserves

The PCC does not currently have a formally adopted policy on financial reserves. However, as at 31 December 2024 we are holding £62,599 in unrestricted funds which is in line with the Charities Commission recommendation which is to have three months of operating costs available in reserve.

Actions to Ensure Financial Stability

Whilst operating in a parish vacancy, the PCC has taken significant action in 2025 to ensure good financial management. The first related to the 'mission enabler' role which was created on two-year contract commencing in August 2023. Following an appeal, this contract was extended for one year to the end of September 2026. The second was a stewardship campaign held in September with the focus on increasing general church funds. The resulting commitments suggested a 12% increase in overall funds from congregation members who were able to respond to the campaign. (See appeal summary document in appendix to this report).

Church Administration

A church vacancy can be a time of vulnerability for both staff and volunteers. I am pleased to be able to report that 2025 has seen a strengthening of the office team in Holy Trinity Church. We have been blessed with our staff team doing all they could to ensure that the organization and management of our day-to-day processes went well and in fact beyond that. Whilst there is always more that can be done to improve efficiency, our systems and processes have developed well. Family Church

As we build towards the ending of Family Church, this is done with trepidation and anticipation. Family Church works well. It meets the spiritual needs of the community it exists to serve and numbers are good. We recently had 96 people with a few regular families missing, and we had to ask our regulars to stand or sit on the floor and make space for guests. However, we do acknowledge the difficulties for the wider church because of the existence of Family Church.

I am willing to let go of something that is good, for something that is going to be even better. This is my prayer and heart and is about the re-imagining of Sunday worship. What is extremely important in these uncomfortable next steps is not just what is done, it is the way that it is done. My desire is to take people with me in this 'step of faith', to honour the amazing leadership team that has served at Family Church and to go into the future God is calling us into, as a church, with hopeful anticipation of something amazing.

The Bible verse that springs to mind as I pray about this new chapter is Paul's prayer from Ephesians 3 verse 20 'Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine – according to his power that is at work within us' – God's power is at work within us as a church, let's continue to be faithful to what God is calling us to do.

10. SAFEGUARDING REPORT 2025

For those of you who are not familiar with the role of the Parish Safeguarding Officer (PSO), this is how the role descriptor describes the work of the PSO:

“To work with the vicar and PCC in promoting safeguarding within the parish, and to ensure that church leaders are implementing the Church of England’s safeguarding guidance. The Parish Safeguarding Officer is the key link person between the parish and the Diocesan Safeguarding Team.”

Over the past few years, to help prioritise the safeguarding work within the parish we have been using the **Safeguarding Dashboard**. This was developed by Clearly Simpler Limited and is currently being used by over 10,000 parishes throughout the Church of England.

The Safeguarding Dashboard has three levels:

Level 1 - Safer Foundations

Level 2 - Safer Activities – we make a list of any church activities for children, young people and vulnerable adults and the PCC must review and approve the list of church activities. In a recent up-grade, we have been encouraged to focus on how we induct volunteers and provide them with ongoing support.

Level 3 - Safer Practices – we have now reached the final level, focusing on safer practices, particularly how we support victims and survivors and how the Parish wishes to promote a healthy and safe culture.

We have made progress towards 95% of the Mandatory Requirements. The PCC has formed a Safeguarding Subgroup to review progress towards the Safeguarding Action Plan. This is a document produced through the Dashboard to identify progress towards the Mandatory Requirements. The PSO reports on the work of the Subgroup to the PCC on a regular basis.

John Housley and Alison Ratcliffe take a lead in supporting volunteers, facilitating their on-line safeguarding training and registering them with the Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS), where appropriate. This year they have entered the details of all volunteers connected with activities listed on the Dashboard onto the **Safeguarding Hub**, which has a suite of tools to help the parish with safer recruitment and people management.

Stage 1 – helps parishes to keep track of DBS checks and safeguarding training.

Stage 2 – helps parishes to create Role Descriptions and Person Specifications.

Stage 3 – helps parishes with safer recruitment and people management.

The next few months will be very busy for them as a few volunteers have DBS certificates that need updating or online training modules that need to be completed. During this coming year we will be focusing on ensuring we meet all the requirements for safer recruitment as set out in Stages 2 and 3.

I would like to thank all those who have helped with the administration of safeguarding and training needs, especially to John Housley and Alison Ratcliffe. A few safeguarding issues have arisen within the last 12 months, but I believe that people at Holy Trinity have dealt with them in a professional way.

Regular Safeguarding reports are given to the PCC. Much of our safeguarding conversations continue to be about the development of the Parish Dashboard and Hub. Personally, I have found their support and feedback very encouraging.

With the Great Commission of the Lord Jesus to make disciples firmly in mind, the Outreach Group undertook a comprehensive review of its approach to outreach and evangelism. This review encompassed activities both within the church family and the broader local community.

The primary aim of this exercise was to gain a deeper understanding of the existing opportunities available to introduce the gospel to individuals and groups who participate in church services or attend activities held within the church premises.

Before launching any specific outreach programmes, the Group identified the importance of engaging the entire church family in regular prayer for evangelism. This commitment to prayer is considered foundational and will be developed further in the future.

Looking ahead, the strategy will focus on enhancing the gospel emphasis across the various activities organised by the church. Additionally, efforts will be made to equip leaders so they can share the good news of the Lord Jesus with greater effectiveness.

Throughout 2025, the Group hosted several Hope Explored and Christianity Explored courses, which resulted in clear indications of individuals coming to faith. Buoyed by these encouraging outcomes, plans are in place to hold additional courses in 2026, including an Alpha course scheduled for the autumn.

One ongoing challenge is recruiting sufficient volunteers to help lead these courses and to embed a “discipling” initiative within the church family. The Group continues prayerfully to seek more people to serve in these roles, with the objective of establishing effective evangelism as a core characteristic of our congregational life.

12. MISSION PARTNERSHIP GROUP REPORT 2025

MPG is a sub-group of and reports to the PCC. We meet 4 times a year. The members of the group are Robert Ankcorn, Sue Ankcorn, Sue l'Anson, Cathie Rutter, Karen Sharma, Adele Martin, Helen Wilks, Barry Crompton, Phil Carman.

This last year has been the first year of our three-year cycle when the congregation are asked to nominate partner charities for Holy Trinity to support. We tithe 10% of our giving to support partner charities at home and abroad and follow criteria laid down by PCC.

The charities are divided into major and minor partners with majors receiving £2500 and the minor ones £500 every year for the 3 years. As well as financial support the partners receive prayer support and sometimes, when local, physical help too.

Our current major partners are Artizan International, The Walshs (CMS partners in Brazil), Kajo Keji, The Diocese of Lake Rukwa and In2Out.

Minor partners are The Walled Garden, Wellspring, New Beginnings, Alianca Oopittikuxa, JennyRuth workshops, CAP, Scripture Union, CPAS, Ripon and Rural Driving and Tear Fund.

All our partners are represented on the display in the Arches with regular updates and newsletters by Karen. Each partner has an allocated Holy Trinity congregation member, not necessarily on the MPG committee, to be a point of contact. There is a prayer rota so that the focus is on that partner at least once in a year. The partners are invited to come and talk to the congregation at least once in their three-year cycle or highlight their charity in any way they may wish to.

Perhaps the highlight of the year for the group is the effort Barry Crompton made in making personal contact with Lake Rukwa which culminated in a visit to the Diocese, Bishop Ephraim and attending several confirmation services.

Invitations were sent to local partners to Phil's installation service and several were in attendance.

Artizan have spoken in the 10.30 service and family church in 2025. We had hoped to include more but hasn't been possible this year. And Bishop James of Kajo Keji read a lesson by video in one of the services.

All our partners have received their monetary gifts for 2025, and we have received messages of thanks from them.

Our thanks to Jed Bates who stepped down from MPG as he and his wife moved away to Lincolnshire. For many years he served with our group and he tried very hard to establish a CAP group locally.

If you would like to join our group do ask one of the members listed above.

13. VICAR'S REPORT 2025

"May the God of hope fill you with joy and peace..."

Officially the Vicar's Report for the APCM covers the previous calendar year, so, January to December 2025. As I only began my role here in November 2025 that should mean a very short report!

However, I think it would be helpful for me to share some reflections of my first few months here at Holy Trinity and sketch out some vision for the coming months and years.

Firstly, I want to say Thank You. It's impossible for me to overstate my sense of deep gratitude for the warmth of the welcome we have received since arriving (back) in Ripon. I felt a strong sense of call to take up this role, the nudge of the Holy Spirit, the conviction that this is where God wants me to be. Living life with God has taught me that following that call does not mean that things will be easy, but it does mean that God will be present and active. And once again that has proven to be the case. He is faithful and good.

I have been so encouraged by the life, ministry and mission of Trinity. To see the day in day out activities that offer welcome, encouragement and belonging to so many. Ministries that nurture faith and discipleship in all ages.

There's a sense of excitement about what God is doing among us in our worship, ministry and mission, alongside a deep thankfulness for what has gone before and an expectancy for all that is still to come.

Through a process of prayer, conversation and discernment, three priorities for this season in the life of our church have emerged:

1. **Discerning and articulating a clear vision** that brings unity of purpose and mission to Holy Trinity.
2. **Bringing the two 10.30am services together**, with a current target timeline of September 2026.
3. **Planning for the celebration of our 200th anniversary in 2027.**

These priorities sit within our wider vision statement:
"Worshipping, Nurturing and Adventuring in the Way of Christ."

The PCC has agreed these priorities, and a core group has been established to take them forward. Following the PCC Away Day in March, two task groups have been formed: one to facilitate bringing the two 10:30 services together, and another to plan for the 200th anniversary.

All three of these priorities will involve many more people than just the PCC, core group or task groups. This is something the whole church family is invited to take part in, as together we seek to join in with what God is doing among us.

Week of Prayer: We have set apart the first week of June (1st – 7th) as a week of prayer to help us hear from God in this process. There will be a prayer space in church available all week and regular slots to join together as we seek God's will.

In a busy church like Holy Trinity, especially in a new and exciting season such as this, it can be easy to be caught up in activity and development. I sense the Lord reminding me that everything we do as a church - our vision, plans, ministries and gatherings - must be offered in humility and obedience to Jesus. When it comes down to fundamentals it is a simple strategy: to follow Jesus and to seek His Kingdom.

In the weeks leading up to my taking on this role, and in the months since, the words of Scripture that have remained with me are from Romans 15:13. They have become my prayer for us in this season. In this single verse, we are reminded of who God is, what He gives, how He fills us by His Holy Spirit, and how His joy and peace within us overflow to the world around us.

Let us receive this as both a blessing and an affirmation for the months and years ahead:

“May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit.” Romans 15:13

1 Accounting Policies

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical costs convention, in accordance with Church Accounting Regulations 2011 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with FRS102 (effective 1 January 2019) - (Charities SORP (FRS102) and the Charities Act 2011).

1.2 Funds

General funds represent the funds of the PCC that are not subject to any restrictions regarding their use and are available for application on the general purposes of the PCC. Funds designated for a particular purpose by the PCC are also unrestricted.

The financial statements include all transactions, assets and liabilities for which the PCC is responsible in law. They do not include the accounts of church groups that owe their main affiliation to another body or those that are informal gatherings of church members.

1.3 Income

Voluntary income and capital sources

Collections are recognised when received by or on behalf of the PCC. Planned giving receivable under Gift Aid is recognised only when received. Income tax recoverable on gift aid donations is recognised when the income is recognised.

Grants and legacies to the PCC are accounted for as soon as the PCC is notified of its legal entitlement, the amount due is quantifiable and its ultimate receipt by the PCC is reasonably certain. Funds raised from events are accounted for gross.

Income from investments

Dividends are accounted for when due and payable. Interest entitlements are accounted for as they accrue. Tax recoverable on such income is recognised in the same accounting year.

1.4 Expenditure

Grants

Grants and donations are accounted for when paid over, or when awarded, if that award creates a binding obligation on the PCC.

1.5 Balance sheet - Fixed assets

Consecrated property

Consecrated and beneficed property of any kind is excluded from the accounts by s.10(2)(a) of the Charities Act 2011.

Other fixtures, fittings and office equipment

Equipment used within the church premises is depreciated on a straight line basis over 5 years. Fixtures and fittings are depreciated over a maximum of 10 years.

Individual items of equipment with a purchase price of £500 or less are written off when the asset is acquired.

1.6 Current assets

Amounts owing to the PCC at 31 December 2025 in respect of fees, rents or other income are shown as debtors less provision for amounts that may prove uncollectible.

Short-term deposits include cash held on deposit with the CBF Church of England Funds.

11 Church Workers Pension Fund (CWPF)

Holy Trinity (Ripon) participates in the Pension Builder Scheme section of CWPF for lay staff. CWPF is administered by the Church of England Pensions Board, which holds the CWPF assets separately from those of the Employer and other participating employers.

CWPF has two sections:

- 1.the Defined Benefits Scheme
- 2.the Pension Builder Scheme, which has two subsections;
 - a.a deferred annuity section known as Pension Builder Classic, and,
 - b.a cash balance section known as Pension Builder 2014.

Pension Builder Scheme

Both sections of the Pension Builder Scheme are classed as defined benefit schemes.

Pension Builder Classic provides a pension, accumulated from contributions paid and converted into a deferred annuity during employment based on terms set and reviewed by the Church of England Pensions Board from time to time. Discretionary increases may also be added, depending on investment returns and other factors.

Pension Builder 2014 is a cash balance scheme that provides a lump sum which members use to provide benefits at retirement. Pension contributions are recorded in an account for each member. Discretionary bonuses may be added before retirement, depending on investment returns and other factors. The account, plus any bonuses declared is payable, unreduced, from age 65.

There is no sub-division of assets between employers in each section of the Pension Builder Scheme.

The scheme is considered to be a multi-employer scheme as described in Section 28 of FRS 102. This is because it is not possible to attribute the Pension Builder Scheme's assets and liabilities to specific employers and means that contributions are accounted for as if the Scheme were a defined contribution scheme. The pensions costs charged to the SoFA in the year are the contributions payable (2025: £1,501, 2024: £1,419).

A valuation of the Pension Builder Scheme is carried out once every three years. The most recent valuation was carried out as at 31 December 2022.

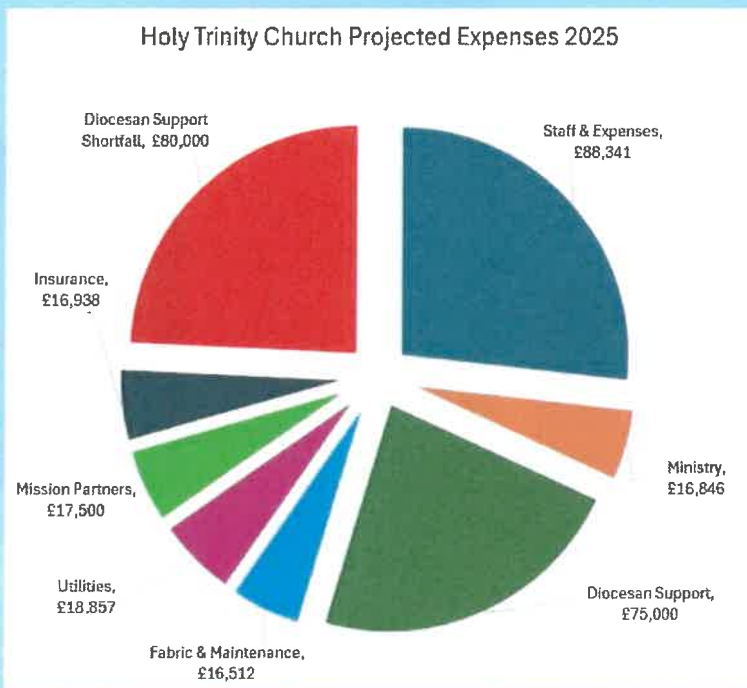
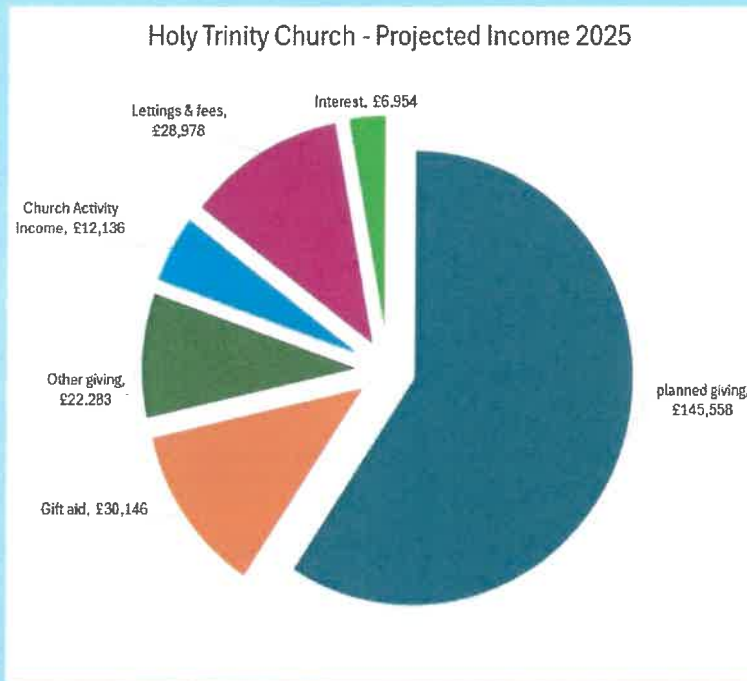
For the Pension Builder Classic section, the valuation revealed a surplus of £34.8m on the ongoing assumptions used. At the most recent annual review effective 1 January 2025, the Board chose to grant a discretionary bonus of 6.7% to both pensions not yet in payment and pensions in payment in respect of service prior to April 1997; and a bonus on pensions in payment in respect of post April 2006 service so that the pension increase was 2.7% (where usually it would be calculated based on inflation up to 2.5%). This followed improvements in the funding position over 2024. There is no requirement for deficit payments at the current time.

For the Pension Builder 2014 section, the valuation revealed a surplus of £8.5m on the ongoing assumptions used. There is no requirement for deficit payments at the current time.

The next valuation is due as at 31 December 2025.

The legal structure of the scheme is such that if another employer fails, Holy Trinity (Ripon) could become responsible for paying a share of that employer's pension liabilities.

Preparing The Ground
